Monday

Reflect & Pray

forced migrants in the UK.
This Refugee Week, poems written
by their refugee friends will form
part of an exhibition titled 'You Can
See Me, But I Don't Exist', and will be
on display at Stratford Library
throughout the week.

Refugee friends perform and read
their poems later in the week.

Wednesday

Love the Stranger

The CBCEW have published a document presenting a Catholic response to refugees and migrants, outlining 24 principles.
